More than a bag of groceries

It happens that quickly

The happy family of six was financially secure and living comfortably. Both parents worked, the older children excelled in high school and earned college scholarships. They carried a mortgage on their home, but put money into their "rainy day" fund every month. They always found the time and funds to support local charities.

So how is it these parents knocked on the door at Together We Cope one day this summer with the modest request for one bag of food to feed their children?

What happened to this family in just 24 months is another story from "The Recession That Lingers." The federal government says the recession is over and the nation's economic recovery is under way. But for many average Americans hit hard by this downturn, their lifestyle continues to deteriorate.

Dad and his eldest son were skilled tradesmen – until the bottom fell out of the construction industry and both were laid off. Unemployment compensation checks kept the family afloat, and Mom retained her full-time job. Then, suddenly, their boat began taking on water.

Unemployment compensation benefits ran out, but Dad and son still were not called back to work. Mom was injured at work and sent home. She qualified for workmen's compensation, but there was a delay in processing the claim. The family quickly exhausted the

savings so carefully set aside in previous years, and borrowed funds from family members in order to keep their home. One student in the family found part-time summer work, but the pay was meager.

Basically at zero income, the family finally came to Together We Cope. Then we did what we do best: Plug the client into all the resources at our command.

We immediately packed six bags of food and scheduled another food pickup for the next month. Because we were in the midst of our annual Back to School drive, we supplied three of the family's students with school supplies. We issued the family a clothing voucher for our resale shop. We used our Salvation Army relationship to obtain funds to pay the family's ComEd bill, and linked them to other food programs in the region. We helped Mom complete an online application for food stamps. We directed Dad and his son to job training programs as they consider career changes.

Mom looked a little dazed. "We thought we'd get a bag of groceries. We never expected to be embraced like this. We feel like we've all been hugged," she said with a big smile.

Our pantry shelves need filling

Together We Cope feeds more than 50 families each day with groceries we purchase at a discount from the Greater Chicago Food Depository, or that we receive from local food drives and individual donors. Under normal circumstances, this is enough food to meet the needs of south suburban residents who seek assistance from TWC. But these days are not the norm.

"I've never seen our food supply so low in all the years I've been here," said Carol Ettema, director of food pantry services for TWC. "It's a combination of greater demand for our services, and the current higher cost of food. We give our clients whatever we have on hand the day they come to us, but in recent weeks our shelves are nearly bare of the staple items that normally fill the grocery bags we give to local families in need." Ettema said there is special need for canned soup, peanut butter and jelly, pasta and cereal.

Ettema said there are three ways people can help: donate food, donate money to be used for food purchase, or donate time volunteering at the Greater Chicago Food Depository. Volunteer hours at the depository that are given in the name of TWC earn points that can be used to purchase food for our pantry.

Together We Cope links to other agencies in new Hub program

The Hub, the new referral system for the south and southwest suburbs, streamlines and expedites the process of connecting people with the services they need. Instead of handing clients a list of places where they might seek further help beyond what TWC can give them, we find precisely the right agency for their need and make the contact for them.

This new venture is made possible by the JP Morgan Chase Foundation. Along with partners Ford Heights Community Service Organization, Institute for Consumer Credit Education and United Way, TWC is building a large

data base to better expand the reach of its services. "Now we can tap into many other regional sources to further serve our existing clients, as well as new clients who might find us via the Hub," said Ann Rodgers, Hub coordinator.

Kerry is performing an unpaid internship at TWC as part of her college graduation requirements. She earned her degree in recreation management from Illinois State University this spring, and will receive her diploma at the completion of her 12-week internship. "I'm so excited about getting my degree in the mail, I just can't wait to see it," she said with a big smile. Kerry's internship is in the marketing and fundraising department of TWC. She has assisted with all fundraising efforts this summer, including TWC's major back-to-school program to equip youngsters with needed school supplies. "It's so cool to see people come in supporting events like this one, knowing as I do now what that money can do for TWC's work," she said.

With a degree that qualifies her to do recreation management or event planning, Kerry now is considering the possibility of a career with a nonprofit. "Majoring in fun" is how some students in the program describe the college work, and Kerry sees how that can apply to making fundraising fun for a community to do together. "It's easy to get passionate about my

work at Together We Cope. I like the link there is between planning fun events and earning money for a nonprofit to continue its work," she said.

Kerry has learned how to work with limited funds. "It certainly is a challenge to do this work on a tight budget, and that makes you work all the harder to accomplish something," she said.

A graduate of Andrew High School in Tinley Park, Kerry grew up in Orland Hills. Her mother, Mary, introduced her to Together We Cope, as mom has worked as a volunteer for several TWC fundraisers.

Community Financial Services Program



This program provides the tools and education needed to guide each client to a more self-sufficient lifestyle. Partners in this program are Together We Cope, South Suburban PADS, National Able Network and Harris Bank.

After assessing each client's unique situation, the case manager, along with the client, sets goals and a plan of action. Weekly meetings with the case manager help in keeping the client on track. Clients are expected to attend all (3) Harris Bank Seminars addressing budgeting, managing credit and building assets.

The incentives go beyond peace of mind and the opportunity to find better employment. Clients completing all aspects of the program receive a \$5 gift card to Nu2u, TWC's resale shop, and after attending all three seminars, a \$20 gas card. Lastly, upon completion of the entire program, the client receives a \$20 K-Mart gift card.
